Moving Forward...a note from the Program Director



POLICY CHANGES:

Covid-19 in the clinical setting... no changes yet.

- All students must comply with the State of California mandate to be fully vaccinated and boosted against COVID-19.
- To reduce student exposure to COVID-19 students must always wear an N-95 mask and face shield in the Emergency Department.
- Students may not participate in any Chest X-Ray in the Emergency Department unless the patient has been confirmed COVID negative.
- Students may not participate in any exam that involves a COVID -19 positive patient or PUI until a negative test has been confirmed.

New Uniforms are coming!

Starting in Fall 2022, new students will be able to order scrubs in pre-approved styles with the SRJC Rad Tech logo already embroidered on them. The uniforms will include a lab coat. Students are required to wear their SRJC scrubs, ID and dosimeter unless they anticipate being required to go to the OR that shift. If they do go to the OR and go back to X-ray temporarily, they will be required to wear their SRJC lab coat over the OR scrubs provided by the hospital.

To shield or not to shield...

In Fall of 2021, ARRT issued a statement regarding gonadal shielding. In short, they state that

- Health care institutions may adopt varying degrees of gonadal and fetal shielding recommendations.
- Schools with imaging programs should teach students about shielding and the effects of fetal and gonadal radiation exposure.
- ARRT's exams may not specifically refer to gonadal and fetal shielding procedures, but they will include topics on patient radiation exposure and protection.
- Students and R.T.s have the ethical responsibility to act in the best interests of each patient.

SRJC will follow these recommendations and continue to teach shielding. Clinical sites who do not require shielding may grade students on other aspects of radiation protection, such as collimation, following protocol regarding pregnancy status, repeat minimization, monitoring Exposure Index and selection of technical factors.
